## Orth Sculpture

While his design is steeped in critical theory, it arrives to us directly, in understated form. Orth has taught sculpture and design at The School of the Art Institute of Chicago, has a graduate degree in philosophy from Northwestern University, and has published several essays on the philosophy and psychology of design.

Longtime Chicago sculptor David Orth now designs and builds sculpture in his rural studio in northwest Arkansas. David designs sculpture at tabletop to human scale. For indoors or outdoors. He works in bronze, steel and wood.

I live and work in a rural area with a lot of ancient Native American history and interesting animals. I often hear a haunting chorus of coyotes, and at dusk, looking up into the trees very carefully, I'll imagine the silhouettes of deer. I will sometimes feel figures drifting through the mist, too old perhaps to notice me, but somehow guarding the land. I call them the Prairie Drifters. They are upright, part animal, part human, and often have great horns or antlers. They drift slowly or stand stock still, merging with trees.

"Aegean Deconstruction"

#8051 - a wall sculpture Materials: Copperplate

Standard Size: 40W x 40H x 6D

Inspired by archeological finds, the heavy metalplate begins as a section of a sphere then cut and reassembled retaining, imperfectly, the spherical geometry.





"The Sacred Tree"

#9040 - Weathered steel & gold leaf Size various.

This sculpture was originally designed for a hospital's interfaith chapel. Written vertically on an antiqued panel, the optional text for this context reads "The Sacred Tree of Life Grows into the Openness of our Prayer and into the Place of our Infirmity". The original design called for 1/2" steel plate stretching 9 feet end to end.
